



On Friday evening, May 4th, we are planning an outing to Historic Williamsburg for dinner at Shields Tavern. We will meet in the hotel lobby at 5:00pm and car pool to the restaurant. Our dinner reservation is for the restaurant's first seating from 5:15pm-7:15pm. Drawing influences from every corner of the former British Empire, the cuisine at James Shield's Tavern offers an authentic taste of the cosmopolitan nature of the Colonies in the 18th century. Our group will be served a fixed-price menu that includes a choice of either soup or salad for the first course and three main course options with side dishes. After dinner at Shields Tavern, an optional living history program, “Cry Witch,” is scheduled for 7:30pm at the Capitol General Court. The popular “Cry Witch” program is an historical reenactment of the 1706 witchcraft trial of Grace Sherwood and has been performed in Williamsburg for a number of years. The audience is an active participant in the trial. You decide! Is Grace Sherwood a witch? Question witnesses. Weigh evidence. Finally, cast your vote for the guilt or innocence of “the Virginia Witch.”

This is a separate, reservation only, ticketed event for those wishing to experience Historic Williamsburg. Tickets for the one-hour program are \$19 and must be purchased in advance. Those wishing to return to the hotel instead will be able to enjoy fellowship with their cousins in the James Room.

On Saturday, May 5th, breakfast will be served in the James Room from 7:00am-9:00am. Those participating in the tour will depart the hotel at 9:00am and carpool to Historic Jamestowne for a guided tour of the oldest continuous English settlement in the New World. After lunch we will have a guided tour of Yorktown Battlefield Park and learn about the decisive battle of the American Revolutionary War that took place in October of 1781. The cost of both guided tours, including a box lunch, is \$38. We plan to depart Yorktown in time to be back at the hotel no later than 3:30pm.

The annual meeting of the Thrasher Family Association will commence at 4:00pm Saturday, May 5th, in the James Room. Thrasher Family Association president, John E. Thrasher is in charge of the agenda. A Review of our Y-DNA Testing Project

In 2004 our TFA men enthusiastically supported the idea of DNA testing, which at that time meant testing the Y-chromosome for genetic markers passed from grandfather to father to son with very few changes. Other types of DNA testing, such as mitochondrial testing for inheritance on the maternal line and autosomal testing for cousins or any relationship, had not yet been introduced.

Our men wanted to confirm their paper research or have their DNA results show where they had made mistakes and suggest new possibilities for research. I wanted to see why decades of looking by Dot Pruett, Jim Moule, John E., my father and me -- and others

before us – had not produced a shred of evidence that the Thrashers in central Maryland were related to the Thrashers in the South.

At our 2005 TFA meeting, we decided to test with Family Tree DNA (FTDNA), a company in Houston, TX. We settled on the highest resolution test offered at the time, the Y-37 (testing on 37 markers on the Y-chromosome). A “project” was set up for the surname Thrasher/Thresher/Threasher, and between August 11 and September 13, 2005, fifteen men submitted samples taken by mopping their inner cheeks. By February 2006, four more men had tested. The Original 19, all carrying the surname (listed here in alphabetical order), were Albert A., Amos (of the Maryland clan), Barton E., Bill Shelah, Buddy (Robert Patton), Calvin (of the Maryland clan), Craig Stephen, Dale, Jodie T., John E., John Paul, Kenneth Thomas, Lester, Patrick David, Steve (of the Maryland clan), Thomas Neal, Warren Jr., William Boyd, and William Thomas (of unknown lineage at that time).

Our Project now includes 58 men who have tested their Y-chromosome. Y-37 remains our entry-level test, but now many of our men are starting with or upgrading to the higher-definition Y-67 or Y-111 tests. The Y-37 and Y-67 tests require that a man have a Genetic Distance of three or fewer for him and his match to possibly share a recent common ancestor. At the 111-marker level, though, he may show up to a genetic difference of five to presume that he and his match have a common ancestor at or before eight generations in the past.

We've had our share of surprises – what the testing company used to call NPEs or “non-parental events,” but I think “Not the Parent Expected” is a better way to express it. We've had cases where someone with the Thrasher name turned out not to be a Thrasher and other cases where someone with a different surname found out or confirmed that he was a Thrasher.

There are many more Thrasher men out there that we need to bring into our project. Each one sheds a little more light on the tangled web of Thrashers across our country. Who knew that the Thrashers in western Maryland would not be of the same haplotype as the central Maryland Thrashers, or that a long-lost branch of the central Maryland Thrashers would be found in roughly the same area as the lineage followed in Our Thrasher Heritage?

We need to recruit men with the surname for our project. Last year the TFA bought a few Y-37 test kits to give to individuals who might find the price prohibitive, and we still have one or two available. TFA also offers buy-downs for those willing to pay some of the cost of their test kit. Decisions on use of these “scholarships” are made by a panel of three TFA members. Retail prices for the kits are \$169 for the Y-37; \$268 for the Y-67; and \$359 for the Y-111, but prices for men in our project run about \$20 less. The company offers sales at least twice a year and holds occasional pop-up sales when the price is significantly reduced.

Women cannot take the Y-chromosome test, but they can recruit or help male relatives with the cost or donate to our “scholarship” fund. Women without a brother or father to

test may reach out to descendants of a brother to their father, grandfather, great-grandfather, or beyond. We should all be on the lookout for men named Thrasher who are not known to fit into one of our established lineages. In fact, we should encourage any Thrasher male we come across to enter the project.

Our testing company, Family Tree DNA, is one of the few – if not the only – companies testing the Y-chromosome for surname projects. Ancestry.com, 23andMe, and others offer only the autosomal tests. Family Tree DNA's autosomal test is called the “Family Finder” test.

Collecting DNA samples at death

In her blog of January 28, 2018, Judy Russell, writing as The Legal Genealogist, at <http://www.legalgenealogist.com/blog/> informed us that our testing company, Family Tree DNA, will accept DNA swabs collected after death. This is important, as so many of us put off testing relatives, and then regret our procrastination. It is also important to note that testing companies requiring a saliva sample, rather than a cheek swab, cannot offer this service.

You will probably work with the funeral home on this. Some of them are stocking test kits these days or are willing to swab the cheeks of the deceased. Judy recommends that if the funeral home balks at collecting or allowing you to collect the sample, you may remind them that if you have the legal right to be making the arrangements for disposition of the remains, you have the legal right to collect that DNA sample. You may want to print Judy's blog of June 30, 2013 for them.

Descendants of Charles Thrasher, a Former Slave

I can't remember just how many years ago it has been since Alma Jean Parker made a contact with first, Nancy Cherry and then with me. I'm guessing it has been at least ten years or more. Alma had a most interesting story to tell, but also with the hopes and expectations that her ancestor, Charles Thrasher, might be a descendant of one of the Thrasher family of Georgia.

Over the years we worked piecing together as much information as we could find with Alma supplying her family's oral history and current documentation. A couple of years ago Alma took part in the TFA's DNA project, testing with the Family Tree DNA test. Unfortunately the results did not show a blood connection for this African-American family to other Thrashers who have participated in the program.

The TFA DNA program clearly showed us that there are quite a number of Thrasher named families in the US who are not related to each other. We have made a concerted effort to share the genealogy of the various family groups who make up our TFA membership by printing the genealogies in the Thrasher Family Association's newsletters. Here is the first genealogical research that has been compiled for this particular Thrasher family.

Family History:

Charles Thrasher was a slave until the end of the Civil War. It is believed that he was already residing in the Watkinsville District, Oconee County, Georgia, when he met and married Martha Davis. He was a farmer.

Charles' wife, Martha Davis, was also a slave who was sold by landowners in Virginia and brought to Georgia according to recollections of a granddaughter, Mittie Brown, in June of 2001. Martha and her family had a very painful and tearful separation when they were sold in Virginia. Martha was brought to Georgia as was a brother, Henry, who was sold to landowners in Americus, Georgia.

Charles and Martha later married and to this union were born eleven children: six sons and five daughters.


